

Which festival?

This program represents--what do we say? The 7th through 9th Ethnografilm festival? Our scheduled events in 2020 and 2021 did not take place as scheduled owing to the pandemic. We present this effort on behalf of the organizing team, the *International Science Council* and the *International Video Sociology Association*. After discussions with the majority of directors represented in these pages, the consensus was very clear in 2020. An online festival does not work for our community.

We must meet each other in Paris. We must screen our films at the summit of the city. We must argue and laugh over wine at the Autour du Moulin.

The 7th - 9th Ethnografilm festival will take place at some moment. In or out of time!

Our 2020 poster features the *Boulevard Montmartre at Night* (1897) by Camille Pissarro. Pissarro was a Danish-French impressionist born in St. Thomas, who studied with both Courbet and Corot, before joining Seurat and Signac to create the Neo-Impressionist style. This scene was painted about five years before his death, when he could not easily work outdoors. He began sitting at the window of hotel rooms and painting outdoor scenes from the upper floors to get a broad view.



Our 2021 poster features work by the "wild child" of Montmartre, the notorious Maurice Utrillo, who was first treated for alcoholism at 15. He was taught to paint by his mom, Susanne Valadon, a painter, model, and partier. But who was his father? According to Diego Rivera, "After Maurice was born, she went to Renoir, for whom she had modeled nine months previously. Renoir looked at the baby and said, 'He can't be mine, the color is terrible!' Next she went to Degas, for whom she had also modeled. He said, 'He can't be mine, the form is terrible!' At a cafe, Valadon saw an artist she knew named Miguel Utrillo, to whom she spilled her woes. The man told her to call the baby Utrillo: 'I would be glad to put my name to the work of either Renoir or Degas!"



Our 2022 poster features work by Louis-Auguste Lepère, who set up his easel near our theatre and painted the street looking up the hill in 1900. If you take a left turn around the bend, you would walk up into our theatre.

Lepère was a painter, etcher, and a leader in the creative revival of wood engraving in Europe. He focused on daily life and ordinary landscapes. *La rue Lepic et le maquis de Montmartre* shows our beloved windmill peaking out at the upper left corner and--just as the street curves to the right--our equally beloved cafe, *Autour du Moulin*.

Paris! City of Light & Cinema

Théâtre Lepic is located next to the Moulin de la Galette in Montmartre, the summit of the city. History, character, ambiance? Countless films have been inspired by this corner of Paris.

Take the metro to Blanche station. Step outside to find yourself in front of the historic Moulin Rouge, so memorably re-imagined by Baz Luhrmann. You're at the foot of the delightful market street, Rue Lepic, where Amélie Poulain worked as a waitress, in director Jean-Pierre Jeunet's eponymous film. Take a moment to buy a delectable tart at the Petit Mitrons bakery, then stroll up the hill. You'll pass the apartment where Van Gogh lived with his brother Theo, and the Moulin de la Galette, famously painted by Renoir.

This part of the city is filled with historic film theatres—from the blockbuster Pathé on Place Clichy to the tiny Studio 28, the first avant-garde cinema in France. Here, Louis Buñuel premiered his surrealist collaboration with Dali, *L'Age d'or*, though by the time it premiered the two temperamental creators were no longer speaking!

The home of Ethnografilm, *Théâtre Lepic*, is at the corner of Junot and Girardon. The cinema is right across the street from the print shop where Picasso once studied print-making. Down rue Junot is the former home of famous Dadaist Tristan Tzara. Austrian architect Adolf Loos designed the unusual home in 1926. The PARIS FRANCE APRIL 19-23

house next door once belonged to famous poster designer Francisque Poulbot. His illustrations of Parisian street urchins were so well-known that street kids became "poulbots" in the city's ever-evolving slang. Street life in the 18th arrondissement is still fascinating. On the far side of the Butte, or hill, of Montmartre, is one of the city's most varied and vibrant neighborhoods, with thriving West African food markets and traditional Arab cafés where you can smoke a hookah or narghile.

Our venue Théâtre Lepic has its own amazing story. Director Claude Lelouche bought the cinema in 1983 to use as a set. He renovated it into a 1920s-era club for his movie Edith et Marcel, the story of singer Edith Piaf's tragic love affair with a boxer. Upon completing the film, Lelouche turned his set into an atmospheric movie theatre. Today his daughter, Salome Lelouche, runs the programming. During Ethnografilm itself, we retire each night to the argumentarium (our cosy Théâtre Lepic lounge) to discuss films with a glass or two of excellent wine.



NITSAN TAL / ISRAEL, UGANDA, UNITED STATES / 60 MIN




When Israeli artist and TED Fellow, Raffael Lomas turned 50, he knew he wanted his new work to have meaning. So when he learned about a group of South Sudanese children who had been raised in Israel and were then deported to South Sudan, he jumped at the chance to go make art with them and "see what would happen." Over the course of several days Raffael and the students built a house made out of 8000 paper clips – symbolizing the meaning of home.

A Door to God

MARUF NOYOFT / TAJIKISTAN / 13 MIN

A personal meditation on music, history, and tradition, A Door to God, depicts the unique culture of Southeastern Tajikistan, focusing on the relationship between the Pamiri rabob, a lute-like string instrument native to the region, and the people who have been playing it for centuries. The film aims to preserve



Noyoft's connection to his own culture, exploring the ways in which this ancient string instrument embodies the values and ethics of the Ismaili faith and how its music is a language unto itself that has taught generations of Tajiks about their own rich spiritual history.

A Travel to Vienna: The Forbidden Journey

One Bulgarian mother shares a story about the times behind the "Iron Curtain", forbidden travel destinations, and human dignity.

Active (citizen)

Piotr Goldstein, Jan Lorenz SERBIA / 30 MIN



An intimate look at the life and work of a Roma refugee from Kosovo collecting trash on the streets of Novi Sad, Serbia, 'Active (citizen)' is a visual ethnography focused on the material, sensorial and kinaesthetic realities of the protagonist's work and its political and social significance – the daily activism beyond the scope of public recognition. The film is part of a larger visual project on the 'invisible activism' of ethnic minorities and migrants who engage for causes beyond those important for their own community.

Ads In Wonderland

Have you ever wanted to discover the behind the scenes of marketing persuasion? To know what technologies and scientific methods are used to unveil the consumers' black box? ADS IN WONDERLAND gives the floor to those who love advertising: CEOs of advertising agencies, neurosciences experts, industrial psychologists, and data engineers. Yet, it also lets whistleblowers, activists and intellectuals highlight



the dangers of this revolution for our society, the environment and for democracy. After ADS IN WONDERLAND, you won't see your daily ads the same way.

Antonio Norales: Garifuna Guardian

WALKER SIMON / UNITED STATES / 7 MIN

A Honduran-born man in the United States campaigns to keep alive the tradition of the Wanaragua dance of the Garifuna people. The dance memorializes the Garifunas' threedecades-long fight against the British on the island of St. Vincent in the late 18th century, where they escaped the fate of enslavement. The Garifunas are a people descended



from the intermingling of Africans and native Arawak Indians. They have their own language, music and religious practices.

Anything for the ones we love

LOUISE MARIE BEAUCHAMP / CANADA, GUATEMALA / 7 MIN



The indigenous and the white man united by the same fight. A poetic fresco on the state of the planet that depicts the First Nations man fleeing the ecological and humanitarian disaster since the conquest of the Americas. Anything for the Ones We Love is a musical film with INDIGENOUS pianist Salvador Chavajay as the messenger.

Arho-The Afar Salt Trade of Northeastern Ethiopia

TILL J F TROJER / ETHIOPIA / 30 MIN



Using powerful visual imagery this film documents the last journey of a salt caravan in Ethiopia. Relying on strong visual imagery and traditional Afar music, selected by the participant of this project, the film documents how the decline of the salt trade affects the daily life of the communities in Northeastern Ethiopia.

Backstreet to the American Dream

Patricia Nazario / US / 103 MIN



Backstreet to the American Dream is a bilingual documentary that explores the modern-day American Dream. This deep dive into the birthplace of the food truck revolution – Los Angeles – juxtaposes the experiences of American entrepreneurs and Mexican immigrants in the industry, and looks at how street food fosters racial tolerance. Indeed, central to the story are two very distinct enterprises.


ANTONIO LLAMAS / SPAIN / 8 MIN

Bananas Girl

SHAYNA CONNELLY / UNITED STATES / 7 MIN



Seven-year-old Bananas Girl asserts her independence, perfects the art of the non-sequitur and navigates the boundaries between herself and her mom. The film exists in the intersection of home movies, performance art and documentary, incorporating a mother's and daughter's obsessions and their parallel views of what it means to be creative.

Bench Players

GILI NOYMAN / ISRAEL / 8 MIN



BENCH PLAYERS is observational documentation of everyday waiting routines at a bus stop bench. The film focuses on the intricacies of behavior and interactions. It simultaneously presents the colorful and roughness of actual living.

Bereka

NESANET ABEGAZE / ETHIOPIA, UNITED STATES / 7 MIN



Bereka is an archive of family history as told by matriarch, Azalu Mekonnen, and her granddaughter, Samira Hooks. Filmed in Los Angeles and Gondar, Ethiopia, the movie captures the Ethiopian coffee ceremony and explores migration, memory and rebirth. Bereka was shot on Super 8 film and hand processed by Nesanet at the Echo Park Film Center.

BethanyJanelle Moorman / United States / 11 min



A personal documentary about the effect of her mother's suicide on the life of BETHANY.

Between Upstate and Down

SAM HAMPTON / UNITED STATES / 10 MIN



This short film is about a 72-year-old woman who dreams of giving up her life in Manhattan to live and work on a farm in upstate New York.

Beyond The Dam

PLOUMPIDIS / FRANCE / 51 MIN



Beyond The Dam gives voice to salters of the Guérande marshes facing the sea level rise. These women and men produce salt behind the great embankment of the French Atlantic coast, reproducing gestures and maintaining a heritage that have existed for over 1000 years. The films attempts to render the solitary as much as the collective dimensions of this very particular trade through a contemplative and choral shape.

Big FurDan Wayne / Canada, United States / 55 min



If World Champion taxidermist Ken Walker can't find Bigfoot, he'll make one. Big Fur is a wild love story.

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Bread (as food for thought)

Marie Sevela / Russian Federation / 48 MIN



The film is a series of interviews with the inhabitants of St. Petersburg (Russia) today, filmed using an amateur video camera, in the genre of Direct cinema. What is bread? The answers are not that simple. We explore this pot pourri of history, sociology and ethnography.

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Broken Gods

Dakxinkumar Bajrange (Chhara), Alice Tilche / India / 43 MIN



As India's indigenous people join Hindu religious organisations, their gods are literally being broken. While conversion to Hinduism offers the allure of a better life, those who continue to follow their old ways have become ostracized by their communities. Their broken gods have lost the power to protect them from illness and scarcity.

Birth Wars

JANET JARMAN / MEXICO / 14 MIN



Told through deeply personal stories in the trenches of the healthcare sector, "Birth Wars" chronicles a power struggle between doctors and midwives in Mexico about whose vision of childbirth should prevail. While doctors rule over a medical system that aims to be safe and efficient, women often feel disrespected, and their health and well-being suffers. The film follows midwives and doctors in Guerrero and Chiapas, two of Mexico's most marginalized and violent states, as they fight against huge odds.

Burial Services

LIVIA LANGERS / UNITED KINGDOM / 14 MIN



The Shetland Islands, a subarctic archipelago of Scotland, are home to over 70 burial grounds. Set against the dramatic backdrop of the Islands' surreal landscapes, "Burial Services" provides snapshots of the everyday lives of three gravediggers. Each offer reflections, both pragmatic and profound, upon their unusual livelihood, particularly what it means to be to work in such close proximity to death.

Cantagalo Neighborhood


GISELE BARROCO / BRAZIL / 15 MIN



Otavio works as a caretaker in a ranch. He is also a radio announcer in a country music programme of a communitarian radio station in a small village on the Mantiqueira Mountains. Through their participation in the programme, the local rural population connect to each other and present themselves, revealing thus the emotional scenery of the Cantagalo Neighborhood.

Castletown

SCOTT DUCE / UNITED STATES / 7 MIN



Castletown, Montana is the setting for a short film by Scott Duce, it conveys the subtle and profound sense of abandonment with ghost like deer appearing to suggest the former and present residence in this once thriving mining town of the 1890's. The town now sits as a ghost town with restricted access to visitors. The film combines photographs, live footage, and hand drawn animation techniques to present a carefully constructed aura of a uniquely anxious and troubled discarded habitat where even the birds, insects and animals are not fully imbedded in reality.

Collapse

NELSON VARAS-DÍAZ / PUERTO RICO / 29 MIN



One hurricane, one study, thousands dead. On September 20, 2017 hurricane María hit the island of Puerto Rico with category four winds. The local government reported the number of dead at 64, while a Harvard University led study estimated 4645. This film tells the story of the research team that completed this historic study from the perspective of Dr. Domingo Marqués, the only team member to experience the hurricane firsthand. See how the local government reacted to the now famous study, and how a country that distrusts scientists prepares for the next catastrophic event.

Coring for Climate

KATHY KASIC, BILLY COLLINS / ANTARCTICA / 14 MIN



Antarctica's subglacial environment has been so scarcely explored that we know more about the surface of Mars. These subglacial lakes hold a record of the past, historical evidence that will give us clues to understand how the ice might melt in the future. In December 2018, a group of 20 scientists and 30 support staff flew in a ski-plane to a location 300 miles from the South Pole, where they spent three weeks camping on the ice. Using a 2-ton hot water drill, they burrowed almost a mile through the ice to reach Lake Mercer, for the first time ever. This short film follows this team as they unearth new information about our planet's changing climate by sampling sediment from an Antarctic subglacial lake buried 3,600 feet below the ice surface.

Deforestation Made in Italy

Francesco De Augustinis / Brazil, Germany, Italy, Romania, United Kingdom / 68 min



In Northeastern Brazil, in the heart of the Amazon forest, the landscape in front of us is quite different from our expectations. There is only a red clearing, crossed by a dirty road, where dozens of trucks are travelling, transporting commodities. From this desolate place timber, illegally logged in the forest, leaves for its long trip to Europe. We follow the big cargo ships that cross the Ocean, transporting illegal timber, beef, leather and soy to Europe and to Italy. Here these commodities are used to produce most of the Italian specialties, such as furniture, fashion and food. But can we really call "specialty" a product that is entirely based on tropical deforestation.

Diamond Boys

Jaremey McMullin

Libera / 18 Min



Two veteran miners in western Liberia's poorest county converse about the highs and lows of a lifetime spent searching for diamonds. Together, they reflect on the impact that civil war and post-war transition have had on their prospects.

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Dorin and Dorina

FERONIA WENNBORG, LAURA DI PASQUALE, GABRIELA FORFOTA / ROMANIA / 20 MIN

Dorin, 47, has left his life as a musician in Bucharest to move back in with his mom Dorina, a charismatic woman of 77, living in a small Romanian town. They share everyday life with laughter and irony, but as Dorina takes on the role as nourisher, Dorin struggles to find his own space. An intimate film about care, frustration and the multiple nuances of love.



El Antifaz (the counterface)

CLAUS DEIMEL / MEXICO / 36 MIN



The Tarahumara in northwestern México are among the poorest native peoples in Latin America. Not often are such peoples living in cultural resistance, but in an unexpectedly peaceful manner. They live according to their own statements as if they already were dead. They call themselves "Rarámuri," meaning the "footrunners." They are among the best long range runners in the world. In spite of the pressures of modern civilization they maintain their traditional ways. This documentary exemplifies this culture by describing the life of maskcarver Simón Morales. This individual lived until his death half blind and nearly deaf, carving masks for ritualistic use in his community.

Engage Earth


JAMES CHOI / BRAZIL / 16 MIN

Topografías Eróticas explores the physical geography of past relationships—those public and intimate spaces that remain occupied by lovers long after they're gone.

Five women who moved to post-Soviet independent Lithuania from different countries, at different times, and for different reasons. At first glance, the life stories of these women seem unbelievable, but a closer look reveals that it is something that could happen to any of us. How do we construct our world which we call home? Does it stem from our place in society based on our gender, skin color, age, or nationality? Could it be that home is any place where we find compassion, inspiration, talent, love, and a shared humanity? Like roaming asteroids, we move through space: never alone, forming deep bonds along the way. Hundreds of thousands of online gamers mine, trade and fight their way through computergenerated galaxies far, far away from the world as we know it. In the vast and hostile world of New Eden, no one can really be trusted. How can one make friends in the



depths of space? Weaving together the experiences of fourteen Eve Online players, we reveal an intimate story about the ability of online games to forge community and bridge the space between us.

Export My Love

JINGLIN LI / CHINA, UNITED STATES / 30 MIN

In China, it is hard for a divorced or widowed woman to find a good new husband, especially for those who have kids. For thousands of years. this phenomenon has been rooted in the profound Chinese culture. Though losing something, if not all. those women are still longing for love, one of the only things that can provide warmth to them. Export My Love is a



cross-continent love-seeking story between the East and West, following four Chinese women who try to pursue love by finding U.S. husbands. Although they've never been to the U.S. before and most of them cannot speak English, they try their best to overcome these barriers and start new lives.

Family Typewriter

HANNAH ANZI / ISRAEL / 5 MIN



A-Salim family have been typing requests for visitors at the Israel Ministry of Interior Affairs in East Jerusalem for three generations. This film tells the story of a Family Typewriter which runs in the family from father to son and follows Abed A-Salim, head of the family, and the Mukhtar of the Gypsy community in East Jerusalem.

Far faint lights

PAOLO AGUILAR BOSCHETTI / SPAIN / 20 MIN



At the dawn of an era where the cycles of nature have changed and the rural towns are abandoned, four brother farmers accompany and help each other to survive. Ovid, 94 years old; Bibiana, 87; Nicolasa, 85; and Lucio of 84, are the last ones left in a Spanish empty village.

HEIKE ROCH / MOZAMBIQUE / 16 MIN



PANDZA is a Mozambican expression. "Das dificuldades, fazer oportunidades - Turning challenges into opportunities" PANDZA Land Stories is a German-Mozambican collaboration, each story focusing on distinct facets and individual experiences of life in PAIS DO PANDZA. N° 3 fé (faith) DE/ MZ 2019 "...when a Mozambican is really in trouble, he will go to a traditional healer. He will have faith and hope. Even if he denies it later." Curandeiros, the traditional healers and the community of Zion, are not held in high regard by the modern urban society. It is a social taboo subject.

How We See Water

"How We See Water" follows the lives of two young women, Juana Gomez Ramirez and Rosa Maria Hernandez, in San Cristobal de las Casas, Mexico, as they grow from girls to young women and struggle to fulfill their dreams of obtaining an education while also serving a vital role in earning a living for their families. The survival of children in indigenous Chiapian Mexico is both fragile and resonant with community. Working with the guidance of several San Cristobal organizations, Melel Xojobal and the Na Bolom Museum, Starbuck filmed with these young girls and their families for over four years.

Hunger by the Sea

SUE SUDBURY / UNITED KINGDOM / 4 MIN



In Britain, there is a steep rise in the number of people using food banks. Two families and a single man who turn up one morning at a food bank in a British seaside town in Dorset talk of their desperation and shame at having to use one. The film tells of: • The mass clearances of 28 Irish-speaking families from the Irish estates of British Foreign Secretary, Lord Palmerston at the height of the Great Irish Famine of 1847 • The exodus of 173 famine Irish to Canada aboard the ill-fated ship Carricks of Whitehaven and • The homecoming of Carricks descendants to rekindle the home fires back in Ireland and reunite with long lost relatives. The Carricks would wreck off the frozen coast in May 1847. Only 48 of the 173 passengers would reach the shore alive.



The Scout Rangers' high-risk mission showed the brutality, as well as the uncommon valor of men determined to save their comrades from certain death in a close-quarter battle that lasted for five dreadful months.

Not Ok (a little movie about a small glacier at the end of the world)

Dominic Boyer, Cymene Howe Iceland / 39 Min



In August 2019, the world's first funeral for a glacier took place on Ok mountain, honoring Okjökull the first major Icelandic glacier to fall victim to climate change.

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Nyar ki boli (A dialect spoken by Garasias)

SHREYA JAKHAR / INDIA / 20 MIN



The Garasias constitutes the third largest tribal group of Rajasthan. They have a distinct identity, largely an ideological response by outsiders that has been influenced by the British and Indian administrators and academic communities. The Garasias are mainly concentrated in the southern part of Rajasthan. Like other tribes they have a habit of following old customs and rules, which are unique to their community. Their customary laws related to the marriage are entirely different from other rural parts of Rajasthan, cohabiting in live-in relationships outside wedlock since time immemorial. They follow either the system of marriage by contracts, or that of companionate marriage.

"Operation Wolf Patrol," is a feature length documentary about eco-activist, Rod Coronado, and his attempt to end wolf hunting in the United States. Over the course of three years, we watch Rod work to redefine his activism in an era– post 9/11, where some have called him an "eco-terrorist." The film comes to a climax when Coronado's "Wolf Patrol" is met with a tightening of "hunter harassment" laws that prohibit photography on public lands. Now Coronado has to ask himself is he willing to go back to prison to fight a law that some are calling "unconstitutional."

Our Digital Selves: My Avatar is me!

BERNHARD DRAX / UNITED STATES / 20 MIN



"Our Digital Selves: My Avatar is me!" tells the story of 13 ability-diverse global citizens and their avatars as they explore their identity through artistic expression and making a home for themselves in the VR Metaverse. Bernhard Drax explores why a diverse group of people find solace and inspiration in a user-created digital wonderland that only exists inside their computers. Drax sends his documentarian avatar Draxtor Despres into the virtual universe of Second Life as well as next generation VR platforms like High Fidelity and Sansar and follows researchers Tom Boellstorff and Donna Davis as they examine how leading technologists in Silicon Valley design the future of social VR with disability in mind.

Our roots weave the land

Reclamation: The Rise at Standing Rock

MICHELE NOBLE / UNITED STATES / 23 MIN



In 2016 from the summer through the harsh winter at Standing Rock, North Dakota, the youth of many tribes unite the Native Nations for the first time in 150 years and rise up in spiritual solidarity to non-violently fight for Unci Maka (Mother Earth) against the 3.8 billion dollar Dakota Access Oil Pipeline (DAPL). These young Native leaders known as water protectors join together to honor their destiny as they pray by leading a peaceful movement of resistance which awakens the world.

Remember This Voice

JEFF CHAN / UNITED STATES / 8 MIN



He was given a chance to make himself heard. A Los Angeles transplant from Venezuela, who believes that his broken English is an insurmountable hindrance to achieving his own American Dream, is about to give up on his passion for Hollywood when a single defining moment launches his accomplished career as a Spanish-commercial voice actor. Based on the life story of Hernán de Béky, who recorded trailers/promos for over 500 film titles and won multiple Emmy Awards.

Return to Calais

NOAH BENEZRA, JOSEPH TUZZOLINO, EDITH GOLDENHAR / UNITED STATES / 16 MIN



Refugees past and present - an inspiring story and a call to action. In May 1940, Paulette was a teenage refugee fleeing the Nazi invasion of Belgium. Nearly 80 years later, Edith retraces her late mother's vivid wartime diary to honor Madame Ducatel, who sheltered Paulette during the catastrophic bombing of Calais. There she meets today's refugees and the volunteers caring for their safety and dignity. The film brings us close to those who flee and those who care, showing how empathy joins the dots of displacement across generation and geography.

Rice
David Blamey / India / 33 min



The project documents a distinctive process by which locally grown rice is post-produced to make an edible product free of impurities. At sunrise workers arrive to unload the day's rice quota from two huge metal tanks that stand over wood fires. The grain is then loaded into baskets and carried to an outside area of flagstone paving where it is dramatically cast onto the ground. Standing in uneven rectangles in the sun to dry, the grains are periodically turned throughout the day. These drying methods have been skillfully devised to dry the rice evenly before the husk and the bran layers are removed. The techniques employed are both a commercial imperative and a ritual practice.

Road to Zuni

Annapurna Devi Pandey / India / 33 min



Road to Zuni documents the land loss of Zuni Indians and their successful law suit against the federal government through the expert testimony given by their Anthropologist Dr.Triloki Nath Pandey. With no expectation of reward, A Zuni family helps a struggling student from India. When the Zuni Tribe fights in court to reclaim their ancestral lands unjustly taken by the U.S., that student's expert testimony wins them a \$25,000,000 settlement. Professor Pandey's story began in India, where coming out of a small village, he carried nothing but his father's words: "No matter how successful you become, remember where you came from."

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Sakthi Vibrations

Zoe Sherinian India / 85 Min



The Sakthi Folk Cultural Centre, in Tamil Nadu, India led by two radical Catholic nuns uses the Tamil folk arts to develop self-esteem and economic skills in young Dalit (outcaste) women.



Apart from calling a small Italian coastal town home, an 86-year-old local woman, a moody teenager and a Nigerian refugee would not seem to have much in common. But once they begin to share their hopes and dreams about where life's journey might take them, their stories surprisingly overlap.

Solitary Confinement

RAQUEL SALVATELLA DE PRADA / UNITED STATES / 2 MIN

A visual representation on an excerpt from prisoner Chris McBride's letter to the newspaper. This piece attempts to visually communicate, in less than 2 minutes, the amount of time a prisoner spends in a very small confinement, the minuscule amount of time spent outside the cell and the psychological impact this can have.



Some Other Paris

JAMES H. JEWELL III / FRANCE / 15 MIN



A spellbinding look at recent events in Paris including Gilets Jaune protests, theater scene, music scene, writers scene, and more through the eyes of expats and French citizens. Interviews include artists, musicians, poets, novelists, playwrights, a journalist, radio personalities, a gamer, a charity worker, a costume designer/refugee worker, a sign language tour guide, and a rabbi. Revealing discussions include: the trials of living in modern day Paris, politics, money, religion, love, and cheese.

Spirit

JANE DYSON, ROSS HARRISON / INDIA / 19 MIN

When Saraswati arrives as the first educated daughter-in-law in a Himalayan village, she wonders how she will ever feel at home. But faced with the scepticism of an older generation of women, she grows determined to succeed. As the village's ten-day Panday Lila festival approaches, the film offers a window onto the everyday work and spiritual practices that



bind people to each other and the land. An intimate story of longing and belonging in India's sacred mountains, 'Spirit' explores what it takes to make a home in a remote community in the thralls of change.

SqueegeeKhalid Ali / United States / 14 min



The "Squeegee Boys" are best known for washing windshields of cars stopped at intersections around Baltimore. Seen by some as hooligans and by others as entrepreneurs, little is known about the actual circumstances that drive these young men to pick up a squeegee. This documentary follows the working days of seven young men as they navigate the busy intersections of Baltimore in search of tips. Shown from the point of the view of the "squeegee boys", the film offers new insights into the lived experiences of these young men.

Standardized Synchronized

KAISU KOSKI / UNITED STATES / 13 MIN



Standardized patients help medical students practice their clinical and interpersonal skills in preparation for their medical licensing exams. This documentary depicts the work of standardized patients (SPs) in a simulation clinic environment as they perform encounters with medical students. To provide each student an equal learning opportunity the patient portrayals needs to be standardized and synchronized. During these encounters, both the students and the SPs are being monitored and assessed in their performance. SPs take turns grading each other's quality of affect as well as the accuracy and correct amount of information they give to the student.

States of America: Washington

Brad Barber, Susan Krueger-Barber / United States / 5 min



What is it that ties us to the state we currently adopt as the one we're "from"? How does living in our states define us? States of America is a series of short documentaries—one from each of our 50 states—that ask these questions by featuring everyday people as diverse as the landscape in the places they call home. This is a story of Washington. In 1983, Mohinder moved to Northwest Washington and became the first Sikh person to start berry farming in the region. Since then his farm has thrived, he helped build a temple, and his service and leadership in the community planted seeds for a vibrant community of over 100 Sikh berry farmers today.

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Stranger/Things

In the early 1980's, German auteur Wim Wenders gifted new filmmaker Jim Jarmusch with leftover raw stock so that the fledgling director could shoot his breakthrough hit, Stranger Than Paradise. This video essay by Philip Brubaker ponders the overlap between two films that could have once been part of the same film. The behind the scenes story of Wenders' film is finally explored and how his ill-fated collaboration with Francis Ford Coppola indirectly led to the blossoming of Jarmusch's career. The circumstances that caused the historic act of generosity and the similarities between the two films in question leads to a larger meditation on stylistic and thematic unity, and how we watch films.

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Strawberry Fields

SIMON FREY, PRISCILLA RASYID / ROMANIA / 18 MIN



Set in a small town in the foothill of the Carpathian Mountains, Strawberry Fields tells the story of Romanian single mom, Lenuţa. The crosses she bears are heavy, yet she still finds it in her heart to tend to the smallest details and corners of her town. She cares for things big and small, even when others see no value. Her daily routine is about to be disrupted as she prepares her son Alex to stand on his own two feet. Leaving is not a choice nor is it giving up. It is a vital risk that Lenuţa must take to create a better life for herself and those she cares for.

Surveillance Culture

BTIHAJ AJANA, ANDERS ALBRECHTSLUND / DENMARK / 29 MIN



Contemporary life is interwoven with surveillance. Gadgets and applications are increasingly being developed and used for tracking, quantifying, and documenting everyday life activities.

TajenALESSANDRA PASQUINO, ROBERT LEMELSON / INDONESIA / 30 MIN



Shot in the arid landscape of West Bali, Indonesia, Tajen, Balinese for cockfight, follows multiple narrative threads of this ancient spectacle— that of the blade, the rooster, the cockfighter. It is the moment when these elements come together during the bloody match that the real drama begins. With a richly sensory approach that embeds the viewer within the action of the arena, Tajen is a poetic visual evocation of the intimacy, brutality, and festivity of the fight.

Telengits. Nomads of the 21st Century

ALEKSEY BORISOV / RUSSIAN FEDERATION / 26 MIN



Telengits live in the mountains of southern Altai. Some of them still maintain a nomadic lifestyle, graze yaks. The film describes a few days in the life of Aydar, the Zaisan of one of Telengits clans and Robert Chapovich hereditary shepherd in the vast Altai.

The Adventures of Wonder Woman - Inside Peru's Operation Mercury

Max Baring, Dan Collyns, Anastasia Moloney Peru / 55 Min



So, how do you save the Amazon rainforest?

"Adventures ..." looks at the Peruvian government's clampdown on illegal gold mining in Madre de Dios State. The film also explores how, after the building of a new highway from the Andes to the Amazon, some aspects of Andean culture, the godfather system and cosmological beliefs surrounding mining, have helped to drive a complex cycle of exploitation in the neighboring Amazonian state of Madre De Dios.

The Campfire Project

CLAUDIA GIANNETTO / GREECE / 12 MIN



In December 2017, actress Jessica Hecht, producer Jenny Gersten, director Arin Arbus and music director Mary Mitchell Campbell made their first visit to the Ritsona Refugee Camp, one hour north of Athens. Their host was I AM YOU, an NGO devoted to bettering the lives of displaced persons through education, healthcare and legal support. The mission which Jessica was still planning became The Campfire Project. Six months later, 15 international theatre artists, a psychiatrist, a NYC schoolteacher, a translator and a documentary crew returned to the camp. In four week they create an Arabic version of Shakespeare's The Tempest, provide basic educational assistance, and ran wellness classes for residents.

Four Indigenous environmental leaders embark on an extraordinary trans-continental adventure from the Canadian plains to deep into the heart of the Amazonian jungle to unite the peoples of North and South America and deepen the meaning of "Climate Justice". The Condor & The Eagle documentary offers a glimpse into a developing spiritual renaissance as the film four protagonists learn from each other's long legacy of resistance to colonialism and its extractive economy. Their path through the jungle takes them on an unexpectedly challenging and liberating journey, which will forever change their attachment to the Earth and one another.




A woman reminisces about her old friend who was a well known sculptor and guides us on a haunting walk through a sculpture park where only a few of his remarkable pieces still stand.



The film explores these traditions by mixing music from Italian deep techno producer Luigi Tozzi with images from Vodou ceremonies recorded in Haiti.

We The Things
